1. Recognize unsafe food preparation, handling and storage practices
2. Identify the critical role of adequate hand washing techniques and facilities in the prevention of foodborne illness.
3. Identify the regulations that apply to early childhood care and education facilities pertaining to time/temperature abuse.
4. Identify the role of consultants in training owner/directors about adequate sanitizing of food contact surfaces.
5. Identify proper food handling strategies to prevent cross contamination during the food preparation process, including eliminating bare hand contact with ready-to-eat foods.

Purpose:

To keep consultants working with early childhood care and education businesses informed of food safety strategies and regulations.

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In 2009, there were over 40 million meals served to one of the largest high risk populations in Iowa—infants and young children in Iowa Early Care and Education settings. This vulnerable population may consume up to 75-100% of their daily food intake in out of home care. Yet, the providers who prepared and served meals to this high risk population are not required to have a food license. In the last 20 to 30 years, the emergence of 14 new food borne pathogens put these infants and children at a greater risk of food borne illnesses.



Jennine Wolf, CP-FS, CEHT, Public Health Inspector and the Washington County Environmental Health Department have opened doors of communication with the early care and education facilities in their county by finding diverse ways of teaching food safety education to providers. Jennine will present information consultants need to help them assess basic food safety in child development homes and child care centers; the Iowa Food Code requirements for food establishments (restaurants, convenience stores, home food establishments, etc.) that can serve as a basis for consultant recommendations to improve the safety of food preparation, handling, and storage in early care and education facilities; and local resources for consultants and providers with concerns about food safety.
